By road... Leave the Motorway at Junction 36 and follow the signs for A590 and Ulverston.

By bus... There are regular bus connections to Ulverston. For timetables and fare enquiries telephone **0871 200 22 33**

By rail... The Furness line, north from Lancashire or south from Carlisle is a scenic coastal journey, calling at Ulverston. Direct services from Manchester Airport to Barrow-in-Furness also call at Ulverston. Rail journey times: Lancaster to Ulverston 37mins; Preston to Ulverston 53mins; Bolton to Ulverston 1hr 20mins; Manchester Piccadilly to Ulverston 1hr 40mins

1 TYDE

A major hit of the 2010 Summer Festivals (Cambridge, Sidmouth and Big Session) Tyde come to Ulverston with the same class and an even bigger sound. With music that draws on influences from every corner of the British Isles and beyond they deliver modern, punchy, danceable tunes, carefully arranged songs and intricate, emotional slow sets.

2 KATRIONA GILMORE AND JAMIE ROBERTS

Katriona Gilmore & Jamie Roberts combine astounding lap-tapping guitar, fiery fiddle and their trademark harmonies with considerable songwriting talent to make a truly distinctive sound.

3 WILL POUND AND DAN WALSH

Will Pound ('one of the most original harmonica players in Britain') and Dan Walsh (and 'the UK's top Clawhammer style banjo player') are two of the most exciting and unique young musicians on today's music scene. Prepare to be astonished by stunning vocals, frailing banjo wizardry and sounds you didn't think were possible on harmonica. Will recently appeared on our TV screens in Goldie's band preparing to perform at Buckingham Palace!

4 GAVIN DAVENPORT

Gavin is a singer, writer and performer of folk music within the English tradition. Gavin plays guitar, cittern, mandolin, Anglo concertina and clawhammer banjo as well as performing unaccompanied.
